*Notes that connectivity policies should reduce negative externalities, such as environmental impact and pollution, highlights the importance of sustainability throughout this strategy; encourages the EU to engage with Asian partner countries to make transport connectivity with Asia safer and more secure non the least in the field of data flows, mobility and cybersecurity;*

*Underlines the importance of European outermost regions, especially those that are closer to Asia and highlights their economic potential; encourages the Commission to facilitate investments in those territories in order to strengthen their connectivity and boost their economy.*

14. *Points with great emphasis to the fact that digitalisation is a key dimension for the 21st century and underlines its impact on the every day life of every single citizen worldwide; therefore (AM 129) calls on the Commission and the Member States to step up their ambition for the digital transformation; expects the EU to become a competitive global actor on a par with the US and China in digitalisation; considers, in this context, the promotion of digital connectivity and digital access (AM 133) through very high capacity networks based on fibre and 5G (AM 128) a high priority for the EU; believes that the development of open strategic autonomy in this sector must include diversification of the supply chain of equipment manufacturers through the promotion of open and interoperable network architectures and (AM 128, AM 139) digitalisation partnerships with third countries and regions (AM 127, AM 131), who share our values and deploy technology in full respect of fundamental rights (AM 131); urges the Commission to condition connectivity projects with third countries on the ethical use of technology both domestically and abroad (AM 137); emphasizes that the security aspect in this connection is paramount (AM 134);*

**14 b new.** **Recommends to significantly ramp up efforts to cooperate with ASEAN countries, India, Japan, the US, Australia, Canada, South Korea, New Zealand and others on data protection to advance adequacy decisions for data flows; considers that provisions on e-commerce and digital trade in trade agreements should serve the objectives of the digital pillar of the Strategy (INTA 4); notes, with regard to data flows, that the EU side has already tabled proposals in several negotiations in line with data protection and the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR); notes that the adequacy decision on Japan sets an example for furthering digital integration (INTA 3); advocates linking the digital connectivity agenda to the forthcoming EU Global Digital Cooperation Strategy (AM 127);**

***17a. Strongly welcomes ongoing negotiations for building a connectivity partnership with India; hopes that the rotating EU Council presidencies, as well as the subsequent G20 presidencies, of Italy and India will use their leverage to move forward; *notes the South Asia Regional Infrastructure Connectivity Initiative (AM 177); takes note of India's participation in the Bay of Bengal Initiative for Multi-Sectoral Technical and Economic Cooperation (BIMSTEC) and the International North–South Transport Corridor (INSTC) (AM 177); especially in the current circumstances, the role of India should increase and deeper cooperation between the EU and the South-Asian states must be sought (AM 176); advocates contributing to coordinating the connectivity strategies as the World Bank counts 16 connectivity initiatives in the Asian region;*

Reminds that both the Russian Federation and Turkey also have interests in becoming stakeholders in EU-Asia connectivity; is willing to partner with them where possible (AM 201); recognises that countries in Central Asia have benefited significantly from greater integration in the global economy over the past two decades; ~~opines~~ is of the opinion that the EU should play a much bigger role and become one of the key players in the region (AM 185, INTA 7), using trade and investment as a driver for shared prosperity; expresses concern that projects funded by China in Central Asia lack transparency; insists on prioritising high labour and environmental standards and ensure debt sustainability (INTA 7);*

*Whereas global actors have recognised in recent years the potential for transport connectivity and have taken the lead to pursue a strategic development of the global infrastructure; whereas new opportunities for EU-Asian transport networks are arising, particularly in the rail and maritime sectors; whereas the COVID-19 crisis has shown that transport continuity with Asia has been essential to guarantee the supply chain for all types of goods (AM 40) , whereas EU-Asia transport excels globally in trade volumes and distances travelled; whereas it is necessary to guarantee the safety and security, and the ecological sustainability in particular with regard to greenhouse gas emissions of whatever mode of transport is used between the EU and Asia;*
