Dear Ms Verheecke.

I refer to your email of 9 June 2016 in which you make a request for access to documents under Regulation (EC) No 1049/2001 ("Regulation 1049/2001"), registered on the same date under the above mentioned reference number.

Your application concerns "all communication, including emails, and documents (agenda, minutes, list of participants, etc) related to the meeting between Christian Burgsmueller and European Liaison Committee for Agriculture and agri-food trade (celcaa) on 8th June 2016".

We have identified the following three documents that fall within the scope of your request:

- A meeting request from CELCAA (email and attached element) dated 9 May 2016 (Ares(2016)2172488) ("document 1");
- Reply to the meeting request (Ares(2016)2256058) ("document 2"); and,

Regulation (EC) No 1049/2001 of the European Parliament and of the Council of 20 May 2001 regarding public access to European Parliament, Council and Commission documents, OJ L 145, 31.5.2001, p. 43.

• The report of the meeting with CELCAA of 8 June 2016 (Ares(2016)2780877) ("document 3").

I am glad to inform you that full access can be granted to the content of these documents. However, some personal data have been withheld in all the documents in accordance with Article 4.1(b) of Regulation 1049/2001. In line with the Commission's commitment to ensure transparency and accountability,² the names of the members of Cabinet are disclosed.

Article 4.1 (b) of Regulation 1049/2001 provides that "[t]he institutions shall refuse access to a document where disclosure would undermine the protection of: [...] privacy and the integrity of the individual, in particular in accordance with Community legislation regarding the protection of personal data."

The applicable legislation in this field is Regulation (EC) No 45/2001 of the European Parliament and of the Council of 18 December 2000 on the protection of individuals with regard to the processing of personal data by the Community institutions and bodies and on the free movement of such data.³

The Court of Justice has ruled that "where an application based on Regulation 1049/2001 seeks to obtain access to documents containing personal data" "the provisions of Regulation 45/2001, of which Articles 8(b) and 18 constitute essential provisions, become applicable in their entirety".⁴

Article 2(a) of Regulation 45/2001 provides that "personal data' shall mean any information relating to an identified or identifiable natural person [...]". The Court of Justice has confirmed that "there is no reason of principle to justify excluding activities of a professional [...] nature from the notion of 'private life" and that "surnames and forenames may be regarded as personal data", including names of the staff of the institutions.

In accordance with Article 8(b) of this Regulation, personal data shall only be transferred to recipients if they establish "the necessity of having the data transferred" and additionally "if there is no reason to assume that the legitimate interests of the data subjects might be prejudiced". The Court of Justice has clarified that "it is for the person applying for access

to establish the necessity of transferring that data", including names of the staff of the institutions.

I consider that that you have not established the necessity of having the aforementioned personal data transferred to you. Moreover, it cannot be assumed on the basis of the information available, that disclosure of such personal data would not prejudice the legitimate interests of the persons concerned. Therefore, these personal data shall remain undisclosed in order to ensure the protection of the privacy and integrity of the individuals concerned.

In case you would disagree with the assessment that the withheld data are personal data which can only be disclosed if such disclosure is legitimate under the rules of personal data protection, you are entitled, in accordance with Article 7(2) of Regulation 1049/2001, to make a confirmatory application requesting the Commission to review this position.

Such a confirmatory application should be addressed within 15 working days upon receipt of this letter to the Secretary-General of the Commission at the following address:
