- José Manuel Durão Barroso led and took part in a number of international missions, notably East Timor's self-determination process and the peace process in Angola in 1990/1991. He was also head of the International IDEA (Institute for Democracy and Electoral Assistance, Stockholm) delegation to Bosnia and Herzegovina in September 1996, and adviser to the United Nations in the Project for the Peace Process in Africa (Tanzania), October 1997
- He was also named member of various informal advisory groups to the Secretary-General of the United Nations, including the Secretary-General's Resource Group on the Democratic Republic of Congo
