Subject: Your request on access to documents

Dear Mr Stabenow,

We hereby acknowledge receipt of your e-mail of 25 July 2013 that we have received from an e-mail address of the website "Ask the EU", in which you have published your request to apply for access to documents in accordance with Regulation (EC) No 1049/2001 regarding public access to European Parliament, Council and Commission documents (OJ L 145 of 31 May 2001, p. 43).

In your e-mail you mention that the reply to your initial request is delayed. Actually EASA has never been addressed with any previous request from your side. Evidence of this is shown in the history of your correspondence on the page of the internet website "Ask the EU" that you have provided us. This page shows that on 26 June 2013 you were informed that the e-mail you attempted to address to EASA could not be delivered to one or more recipients.

We would also like to take the opportunity to ask your clarifications on the content of your request. You apply for access to those documents which indicate whether the amount due for moral damages in the Judgment F-40/12 will be recovered from the perpetrator. Could we ask you who, in your view, you consider being the "perpetrator" in this case?

Under the terms of Regulation (EC) No 1049/2001 you will receive a reply in due course.
