REPORT OF THE 6TH ROUND OF EU-KOREA FTA NEGOTIATIONS, 28 JANUARY – 1 FEBRUARY, SEOUL

The 6th round of EU-Korea FTA negotiations took place from 28 January to 1 February in Seoul. 35 Commission negotiators held detailed talks with the 150 strong Korean delegation. The 6th round covered most aspects of negotiations with South Korea, only excluding the issues of tariffs, automotive non-tariff barriers, and flexibility on product specific rules of origin (list rules). The sides were led by Korean Deputy Minister Kim Han-soo and Director Ignacio Garcia Bercero of the European Commission.

The discussions covered trade in goods (including general text, NTBs other than auto, TDI, TBT, SPS, customs and trade facilitation, and to a some degree rules of origin), establishment and services with detailed discussions on offers and text, and rules (IPR, competition subsidies, government procurement, transparency, trade and sustainable development, dispute settlement and mediation mechanism).

This probably was the most productive round which these negotiations have seen so far. EU and Korean negotiators have agreed on the first building blocks for an ambitious and comprehensive future FTA. A number of **chapters** have been **almost concluded**: Sustainable development, competition (antitrust and mergers), trade defence instruments, transparency of domestic regulation, and the mechanisms for bilateral dispute settlement and mediation. As regards the latter two, the scope of these dispute resolution tools remains to be defined in a horizontal discussion at a later stage.


Negotiations in many other areas have **advanced well**, in some cases also coming close to agreement like on Trade in Goods, TBT, and Customs and Trade Facilitation. This also includes the economically important areas of subsidies, services and establishment, and intellectual property rights where we see welcome progress

In the **goods** area, discussions on NTBs other than auto (chemicals, electronics, and pharmaceuticals) have given important direction. The rules of origin protocol progressed, and a useful technical discussion examined the list rules. Korea affirmed the continued importance of the Gaesong industrial zone also for the incoming administration

- Also on <u>customs</u> and <u>trade facilitation</u>, a considerable number of brackets have been removed, leaving only a limited number of issues outstanding such as appeals, the Korean cooperation proposal (exchange of personnel), confidentiality, or contact points. Korea would agree to include a protocol on <u>mutual administrative assistance in the FTA</u>, and the corresponding provision in the customs and trade facilitation chapter, as long as this will be exempted from dispute settlement. Korea continues to resist the antifraud clause.
- Korea continues insisting that the EC relaxes its standard product specific <u>rules of origin</u> for a number of priority HS chapters. However, possible flexibilities have not been discussed at this round. The focus was on further cleaning the origin protocol, where only a limited number of substantive and procedural issues remain. Both sides also examined more closely the list rules in the priority sectors identified by Korea. The Korean requests on duty drawback and Gaesong have not been discussed.
- Five intensive days of <u>services and investment</u> discussions saw a full reading of the services and establishment text. It resulted in a significant de-bracketing, leaving only a limited list of outstanding items. It is expected that some of these remaining issues be solved in the coming weeks and notably during the March inter-sessional on services.

• In the <u>IPR</u> chapter, provisions on copyrights and trademarks have been agreed. Wording of most sections are close to completion, e.g. on design and enforcement,

On GIs, internal debate in Korea still ongoing -Korea willing to grant protection for both wines and spirits and agricultural GIs,

Draft language on criminal sanctions and data protection for agro-chemicals not yet on the table.

Good discussions continued on the subsidies chapter and removed many brackets.

On government procurement, discussions on market access and various trading scenarios continued so as to prepare for an exchange of offers. Uncertainty about when the EC's will submit it revised offer in the GPA process remains a complicating factor.

As for <u>tariffs</u>, the latest offers remain on the table, the EC's initial offer of July 2007, and Korea's 2nd revised offer of November 2007. Both sides will have to identify a way forward, where they understand and respect their respective sensitivities, while maintaining as high as possible ambition.

For **follow-up**, a programme has been set to carry the work forward. Intersessional meetings will take place over the coming two months to allow notably the work on services and establishment, on NTBs, and on rules of origin to pull alongside the other parts. The chief negotiators encouraged all negotiating groups to continue their discussions by all means of communication. The aim would be to conclude whatever can be solved on a technical level towards the end of March.

In **conclusion**, despite the uncertainty resulting from the current transitional phase in Korean domestic politics, this 6th round proved an important opportunity for the two sides to demonstrate their commitment to these negotiations. This round helped to maintain the good momentum created over the past 8 months since the launch of these negotiations in May 2007. First results emerged during this week, and it is well possible that additional chapters will conclude during the forthcoming technical contacts.
